Welcome 2021 LETTER FROM YOUR CEO GOODBYE 2020


On behalf of myself and the staff of the Hastings Highlands Public Library, I want to warmly wish each of you a healthy and happy New Year!

In spite of the restrictions that were placed upon us in 2020, we were still able to offer limited library service to the community of Hastings Highlands:

- Curbside pickup began May 25th
- The HHPL library opened 3 days/week by appointment only from September 14th - 24th
- drop-in visits 3 days/week for browsing and computer use occurred between September 28th – December 24th. We recorded a total of 286 inperson visits to the library during this time period.
- We began an online book club, promoted special events in-house and online (i.e. Hallowe'en, Remembrance Day, Christmas) and prepared a children's Christmas craft bag that could be picked up for the holiday season.



- We will be subscribing to Kanopy, an on-demand streaming video platform that offers over 30,000 films and documentaries.
- We are currently offering curbside pickup Mondays to Fridays during the lockdown.
- We are implementing our Forest of Reading program.
- We are exploring new possibilities for online programming.


We are continuing our monthly acquisition of new books and resources.


Family Literacy Day takes place every January 27th to raise awareness about the importance of reading and engaging in other literacy-related activities as a family.


FEBRUARY

Your library has expanded our categories in Forest of Reading to include more nonfiction titles: Yellow Cedar, and a new fiction category for young adult readers: Red Maple.





























Freedom to Read Week is an annual event that encourages Canadians to think about and reaffirm their commitment to intellectual freedom, which is guaranteed them under the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Despite having strong traditions of free expression and free inquiry, Canada also has a long-standing tradition of censorship. Historically, books and magazines have often been quietly removed from libraries and classrooms. Freedom to Read Week was founded in 1984 to challenge the covert nature of censorship, creating a broader awareness of these ongoing challenges to Canadian writing, and to allow Canadians to actively defend their right to publish, read and write freely and to widen their understanding of the negative effects of censorship, not just on readers but on writers and publishers as well.


BOOK CLUB

What is this book about:

Educated is an account of the struggle for self-invention. It is a tale of fierce family loyalty and of the grief that comes with severing the closest of ties. With the acute insight that distinguishes all great writers, Westover has crafted a universal coming-of-age story that gets to the heart of what an education is and what it offers: the perspective to see one's life through new eyes and the will to change it.
